We are all Treaty People...

At Victory School, these words are a part of how we start each day. Land Acknowledgements remind us that we all live, work and play on Treaty One Territory. The signing of the Treaties was intended to signify a relationship rooted in mutual respect and stewardship of the land by all people. I recently had the privilege to attend a presentation by Niigaan Sinclair, in which he shared that Canada "...was never supposed to be *Indigenous* and *Settler* people. It was always supposed to be *Treaty Family*." This beautifully captures the spirit of Treaty Education.

Today, Treaty Education is being taught in every classroom, across all grade levels. To support this work, schools are engaging in two days of Professional Development – the first was on September 23rd, and the second is on April 11th. We will be collaborating and exploring a variety of learning resources, including those from the <u>Treaty Relations Commission of Manitoba</u>. VICTORY SPOTLIGHT


This month's Victory Spotlight is from Mrs. McQueen and the Grade 4 students in Room 1:

Room One has been busy learning about light in science this term! We have had many opportunities to experiment and explore light using flashlights, prisms, disco balls, and mirrors. We blended art with science by representing both white light as well as the individual colours of the spectrum (red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, and violet) in our acrylic swipe paintings! We made cyanotypes (a photographic technique dating from 1842!) using our garden light as artificial sunshine! Our most impressive experiment was growing Annapolis red lettuce in our classroom indoor garden, de-pigmenting the lettuce using a special green filter, and then applying a variety of small pictures to the green leaves and letting the pigment return, transferring the pictures to our lettuce leaves!! Our first picture ready is of a duck!!



CYANOTYPE

Cyanotype is a slow-reacting photographic print sensitive to the ultra-violet and blue spectrum. It's one of the oldest photographic processes discovered in 1842. Room One used the garden light which is white light with the whole colour spectrum.













white Light is a combination of all the colours of the visible spectrum: red, orange, yellow, green, blue, in digo, and violet. Room One did an acrylic swipe using all the colours of the spectrum plus white!


















VICTORY READS
