Are You a "Math Person"?

On Friday, January 31st, Neil Dempsey from University of Manitoba joined us at Victory School for a Professional Development Day with Teachers and EAs. We spent the day learning about strategies and tools for teaching Numeracy and Math skills that we're excited to try out!

Just like it is important for adults to read with children and to model literacy skills in the real world, it is important for our kids to see us using numeracy skills and problem-solving strategies in every-day life. There are some easy and fun ways to do this at home for every age: You can ask your kids to help read and measure ingredients when making a recipe, count items when making a grocery list, packing their lunch, or folding laundry, play card and board games, read nutritional labels on packages, use estimation skills, and much more. Using numbers and problem solving in every day life will help kids grow up to see themselves as "math people" and develop life-long numeracy skills.

VICTORY SPOTLIGHT

This month's Victory Spotlight is from Grade 5, Mr. Mar and Room 18:

Over the past three months in Grade 5, we have worked on lots of fun projects. We're excited to share some of them with you in this newsletter!

In Writer's Workshop, we created digital time capsules. This project was inspired by the Voyager Golden Record on the Voyager 1 and 2 spacecraft. We chose five items that reflect our identities and wrote about their importance. Afterwards, we recorded short films discussing each item. We are excited to open our digital time capsules when we are older.

In Science, we created research presentations on the planets in the solar system. We learned about each planet's size, location, circumference, diameter, rotation, and more. Through this project, we learned how to research information and make slideshow presentations.

In Math, we learned about the standard algorithm for multiplication and division. We practiced multiplying and dividing three-digit numbers by two-digit numbers. We also worked in groups using whiteboards to solve different math equations and played fun math games. Room 18 has worked very hard to master the standard algorithm for multiplication and division.


VICTORY READS

A poetic, joyful celebration of the Lands and Waters as spring unfolds, we watch for Robin's return, listen for Frog's croaking, and wonder at maple tree's gift of sap. Grounded in Eptuaptmumk, also known as Two-Eyed Seeing-which braids together the strengths of Indigenous and non-Indigenous ways of knowing - and the Mi'kmaq concept of Netukulimk- meaning to protect Mother Earth for the ancestors, present, and future generations - *Walking Together* nurtures respectful, reciprocal, responsible relationships with the Land and Water, plant-life, animals and other-than-human beings for the benefit of all.


Thanks to our student leadership group, Change Makers, for making a video to introduce this month's *Victory Reads* book to classrooms!



MONTHLY MINDFULNESS

Reconnecting through Reading

Recent research links increased use of phones, social media, video games, and other screen-based activities to an increase in negative mental health. Jonathan Haidt explains this in his book, The Anxious Generation: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness. Changes in our technology use have also led to less time to connect face-to-face with our friends and family, without interruptions. Jody Carrington focuses on this in her book, Feeling Seen: Reconnecting in a Disconnected World.



With more time spent indoors, winter can be a challenging time to decrease screen time for both kids and adults. One of the best ways to reduce screen time for children is to increase their connection time spent with family.

February is *I Love to Read Month*. Reading to or with children is a great way to connect. Even kids who are independent readers benefit from time reading with a family member. Find a cozy spot. Pick fun or interesting books. Focus on enjoyment and a love of reading. Get lost in the story. Talk about it. Wonder about it. Set an intention to be present by turning all devices off or leaving them out of the room to reduce distractions.

Another really fun type of reading to try out is "reading the land". Winter is the perfect time to do this when there is snow on the ground. Take a walk outside and look for tracks. This could be footprints, tire tracks, or animal tracks. Follow them and talk about what might have happened. Notice where the rabbit or squirrel tracks end or change direction. What might be the reason? What do you think happened next? Telling stories about the land from what we observe is making meaning from information – reading. What a great way to disconnect from screens and reconnect with each other!
