We are celebrating the wonderful teaching career of our friend and colleague, Gizele Neduzak. She is retiring after 35 years of teaching in Nova Scotia, Northern Manitoba, and Winnipeg. HANUKKAH – December 14th-22nd

- Hanukkah is the Jewish Festival of Lights. For eight nights in December, Jews everywhere light their menorahs, spin dreidels, give each other gifts and spend quality time with one another. One thing that every Hanukkah celebration has in common is the gelt. The word “gelt” means money in both Hebrew and Yiddish.

Chocolate gelt are the chocolate coins that are typically given to children during Hanukkah.



CHRISTMAS DAY – December 25th

- The candy cane symbolizes Christian beliefs, with its “J” shape representing Jesus, the white color signifying purity, and red stripes symbolizing His sacrifice and blood, while the shepherd’s crook shape points to Jesus as the Good Shepherd guiding His flock.



KWANZAA – December 26th-January 1st

- Oranges hold significance in Kwanzaa as part of the Mazao (crops/harvest) displayed on the Kwanzaa table, symbolizing the bounty of the harvest and the fruits of collective labor, often alongside other traditional African diaspora foods like mangoes, pineapples, yams and corn, representing the fruits of African ancestral lands.



ORTHODOX (UKRAINIAN) CHRISTMAS – January 7th

- For Orthodox Christmas, perogies (varenyky) symbolize prosperity, abundance, and family unity, served as part of the traditional 12 meatless dishes during the Sviata Vechera (Holy Supper) that honors the 12 Apostles, often filled with potatoes, sauerkraut or poppy seed, embodying deep cultural heritage.

Many classrooms in our school enjoyed field trip to the Manitoba Moose Game on November 25 at the Canada Life Centre. For some, it was their first time at the arena and watching a hockey game. Everyone had fun cheering on the team and visiting with the mascots!




COOKING in Room 220

Exploring Identity Through Our Names

This month, in room 105, Punjabi Bilingual program, our kindergarten students have been learning about identity, which often begins with understanding our names and the beautiful differences in our skin tones. A name is one of the first and most meaningful parts of who we are. Students have been practicing recognizing and writing their names in Punjabi language, building a strong sense of pride and belonging. By sharing the stories and feelings connected to their names, children are beginning to understand that every name and every person have value and that we all matter.

We have also begun exploring the art of storytelling through story vines!

A story vine is made from a long piece of yarn or ribbon with small objects attached, each symbolizing a part of a story. As children move along the vine and touch each object, they retell or create a story step by step. This will further enhance the skills of organizing their thoughts, recalling events, and building their confidence in speaking. The students are already enjoying this creative and engaging way to share their ideas!





From Room 101

Students in Room 101 have been joyfully spreading Christmas cheer by supporting the Cheer Board this holiday season. With great enthusiasm, the children collected non-perishable food items and helped prepare contributions that will support families in need. School Reminders

Thank you to everyone for supporting our drop-off and pick-up routines. Please remember that the staff parking lot is staff only and cannot be used for pick up/drop off. The front parking loop is reserved for kindergarten and daycare families, as well as student who have mobility concerns. Please do not park/stop on left side of loop (fire lane) and by the intersection on Novara street. Parking passes are required to enter the loop. Please continue to park a minimum of one block away from the school to avoid traffic congestion.

If your child needs to be picked up early from school or you need to drop off something for the child, we request visitors check in at the office and not go directly to the classroom. Please call the school to inform who would be coming to pick up the child and call at least 15-20 minutes ahead of the pick-up time to give the student enough time to get ready. Thank you for your continued support and understanding.

Thank you for using the streets surrounding the perimeter of our school yard as a drop-off/pick-up location. Please be respectful of our community residences by not blocking or parking in driveways or using them to turn around. We thank you for your support!
