**Room 15** students learnt about reflection and refraction of light using various hands-on experiments.


### Why did the arrows change direction when they were behind water?



To understand more about the importance of hair in Indigenous culture, we read the book My Powerful Hair by Carole Lindstrom. 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# The Use of Social Media in Children



Writer and Psychologist Adam Grant noted that in a powerful natural experiment, banning smartphones in schools had long-term benefits. 3-4 years later, bullying was down by 43-46%. Girls had 29% fewer visits to their primary care doctor about psychological problems and nearly 60% fewer visits to specialists. And the mental health and academic gains were greater for schools with stricter policies and girls from socioeconomically disadvantaged families.

Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy also released an advisory raising the alarm on the effects social media is having on youth mental health. "There are ample indicators that social media can also have a profound risk of harm to the mental health and well-being of children and adolescents. It's estimated that 95 percent of youth between 13 and 17 are using a social media platform, as are 40 percent of children between 8 and 12 years old. "In the advisory, Murthy raised concern about how research shows that the period between ages 10 and 19 is a critical time for brain development, when risk-taking behaviors peak, and it's also a time when self-worth and identity are forming.



## Earth Day

As a school community, students and staff helped clean up garbage around our school grounds on April 22nd for Earth Day.



**ROOM 5** is studying composting & decomposers. Students buried plastic, paper, metal, banana peels, and orange peels to see how quickly they decompose. When we examined the buried materials after five days, we noticed banana peels decompose before other materials. Students learned that plastic wrappers are converted into microplastics over time but cannot be decomposed if not recycled.
