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
Everyone deserves a place to be themselves and to feel safe.

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This year we focused on decolonizing our school. We split this work by focusing on two areas, one was the Circle of Courage and the other was land-based learning.

At École Templeton, we are always trying to focus our responsibilities on the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action. This means that we worked on reviewing and reshaping our curriculum to include diverse perspectives, histories, and cultures. We split this work into two sections: one centered around the Circle of Courage, which emphasizes the values of belonging, mastery, independence, and generosity, and the other focused on land-based learning.

Land-based learning involves connecting students with the land, teaching them about sustainability, traditional practices, and fostering a deep respect for the environment. By integrating these approaches, we aim to create a more inclusive and holistic educational experience for all students.

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Land-based learning

Yo This year our students and staff spend time at the Aki Centre, learning from their leaders and the land. We had also dedicated some of our professional development time working with staff from , learning from their leaders and the land. We had also dedicated some of our professional development time working with staff from Fort Whyte and our divisional outdoor learning educators to learn ways to incorporate land-based teaching in our practice. By reviving cultural practices and increasing the number of knowledge holders, land-based education helps reinforce cultural identity and breathe life back into communities' cultures.

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Literacy and Language Development

YoThis year our students and staff spend time working with Paule Buors, a French language and literacy consultant. Teachers have also been spending time working in collaborative groups on ways to improve student literacy in both French and English through educational leaves, weekly collaborative work time and Teacher Talk time.

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
