Snow...like fireflies...dancing in the moonlit sky. It was beautiful...those few precious moments being fully present with these young children. It was only when the frostbite nipped at my cheeks that I was propelled back to adulthood and responsibility.

A History Lesson: Early Learning Counts



A decade ago, Seven
Oaks School Division
journeyed into the Birth-5
world The importance of
early childhood
development within the
Seven Oaks Community
was recognized and
valued enough to provide
free Parent-Child
programs for parents/
caregivers and children, 0
to age 5 in all 14 K-8

schools. Each Child & Family Centre was staffed with a Community Coordinator, to plan and offer preschool parent/ child programming. In partnership with Healthy Child Manitoba, the Family Centres adopted the 4 pillars of: literacy, nutrition, parenting and building community capacity. Showing further

commitment to early learning, Speech & Language Consultants were allotted time to work collaboratively in the Family Centres. This year, a school psychologist was added to the team, to support emotional well-being and we move forward in understanding Aboriginal parenting perspectives.
