What happened at AE Wright this month?

The students of **ROOM 15**

visited Health Minister Uzoma Asagwara to discuss about health and safety concerns in Manitoba. They observed the debate between ministers in the Legislative Assembly.





Middle Years Band students passed around beanie bags to a song called, "Rain Falling On Umbrellas". If the bags are incorrectly passed due to a change in tempo or direction, a few students will end up with a mound of bags in front of them! This is a fun singing game and it teaches the students a less common time signature of 5/4. The students are actively engaged in making music as the band room is full of singing, playing band instruments, recorder, and drama.





As students in **Room 4** study estimating and shapes, we combined these two essential ingredients in creating one artistic project. Room 4 K-2 Filipino Bilingual class make art pieces using one of the Philippines' staple foods: corn (mais) to form shapes (hugis) that we are studying in Math. Using colored corn kernels, the students enjoyed creating various shapes while doing estimates on how many colored corn kernels are needed to complete their individual art pieces. We witnessed how the Kindergarten students show their fine motor skills in sorting colored corn

> kernels and gluing them to the patterns of shape. Grade school students were so excited in experimenting with shapes and colored corn kernels. The entire Art cum Math Project experience that we called 'Hugis-Mais' proved that learning numeracy is indeed fun when done with artistry and creativity.

Students in **Room 6** were inspired to make some Leprechaun Traps after reading the book, The Night Before St.Patrick's Day by Natasha Wing.

Many students put bait in their traps like shiny coins to try and lure a leprechaun into their trap. Others tried to design a home that was cozy and relaxing, thinking the leprechaun might want to move in! One home even had a bubble bath in it!

Did we catch any? No! Ms.Korade and the students were very surprised to come into school on Monday and find that leprechauns had trashed our classroom! There was a spray painted, "Ha! Ha! Ha!" on our whiteboard, the traps were destroyed, green glitter was everywhere, and small clovers were left on our desks. That's okay, maybe we will catch one next year! **Room 13** students took some time to focus on Ancient Egypt, discovering their culture, religion, and way of life. Through their discoveries, they began to compare the similarities and differences that Ancient Egypt has to the modern world. They have shared their learning through creative posters about their deities, imaginative travel brochures, and advertisements about their inventions!
