The electricity powering our community comes from generating stations on river in Treaty territories 1, 3, and 5. The Northern Flood Agreement with five Indigenous communities in northern Manitoba remains unfulfilled.

We are committed to our Treaty relationship. As a school community, we continually reflect on how we are contributing towards reconciliation today and everyday.

Can you believe it? We have already come to the end of the first term and the winter holidays will be arriving soon. We would like to thank you all for taking the time to come to your child's/children's parent-teacher conferences held on November 24th and 25th. These conferences provided a reciprocal opportunity for teachers in learning about your child's/children's strengths, needs, and learning styles. It also gave us an opportunity to celebrate your child's/children's learning with you. Some teachers had student-led conferences where students shared their portfolios of work and their learning over a period of three months with their family members. This structure allowed students to take responsibility and accountability for their own learning, and it helped to hone their understanding of what it means to meet learning targets.




A CLIMATE ACTION WORKSHOP AT AEW IN PARTNERSHIP WITH CARING FOR ENVI-RONMENT MANITOBA (CEM) AND LET'S TALK SCIENCE (UNIVERSITY OF WINNIPEG) AND IN COOPERATION WITH RECYCLE MANITOBA, CBCRA, AND MMSM

Rooms 11, 12,and P4 actively participated and engaged in meaningful activities on a Climate Action Workshop held on November 29, 2022 at AEW. This workshop aimed to address climate change. It was in partnership with CEM and Let's Talk Science and with volunteer students from Maples Met School. Dr. Jun Sales spoke about the work that his organization does to help care for the environment. There were three stations created for the participants, such as: Let's Make Posters for Water Conservation, Design and Build Microplastic Filter, and 3Rs now 4Rs.

One highlight that had our group talking was the right to clean water. Many northern communities in Manitoba are still under a 'boil advisory,' and don't have access to clean drinking water. Some of these communities are living in conditions that the UN have labeled as "third world," yet we live in a first world country.

Isha gave each student a journal and challenged them to start writing their stories, their hopes, and ways in which they can be advocates rather than bystanders.
