Room 4 Filipino Bilingual Literacy Project

Upon study of the Treaty land and the ever-changing environment, Room 4 continues to ask how ideas and events are inter-connected. The class started to identify that in Winnipeg, one of the treaty lands in Canada, we experience longer winter that affects the life of living things especially the trees and animals. Unlike animals that can migrate or hibernate, trees

can't travel or move to avoid harsh winters. Yet, the beauty of the changing colors of the trees gives us inspiration of the coming spring. Using the book: THE GIVING TREE, A RETELLING OF A TRADITIONAL METIS STORY, students can understand what trees symbolizes in the Metis culture and how these trees were helpful to Metis travellers and families. An eye-opener that indeed all

living things are connected to each other even in the changing seasons.

Visual Arts: Using the Hydrangea dried flowers, our students created miniature models of trees that change their colors during fall season. This symbolizes that darker days are coming and the green coloring of plants started to decrease due to the drop of temperature and the absence of warm light from the sun. This gave inspiration for the students to paint their 'trees' in various colours.





Social Studies. The information we gathered from the Metis story, brought us back to our study about the first nation community that shows respect to nature and values the land that gives us what we needed. Thus, a cycle of giving should be taught to the next generation. This culture of respect and giving is the one we want to achieve in class.

Science. In spite of the weather and natural changes, trees never stop serving their purpose. From the boo,

The Giving Tree by Shel Silverstein that

we read, they were enlightened that trees become shelters to hibernating animals and storage of food to some. They never stop giving!

Literacy. The students finally wrote and expressed their understanding through a written piece entitled, The Giving Tree. A short narrative of their reflection about the ecosystem and beautiful culture.



Inspired by the novel "Everlasting Nora" and Ms. Marion Willis' commitment and dedication to end homelessness in our community, students, staff and families from Rooms 12 and 19 organized a food drive to donate to St. Boniface Street Links, a non-profit organization that provides services and shelter for the homeless. This is just the beginning; we will continue to take positive

action for the community.
