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LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

We take time to acknowledge that we are here on Treaty 1 Territory, and to honour the Peoples and lands of Turtle Island. Treaty 1 land is on the traditional territories of the Anishinaabe, Inninewak, and Dakota peoples, and the national homeland of the Red River Metis. Our water comes from Anishinaabe Treaty 3 territory from the waters of Shoal Lake First Nation #39 and #40.

The electricity powering our community comes from generating stations on the river in Treaty territories 1, 3, and 5. The Northern Flood Agreement with five Indigenous communities in northern Manitoba remains unfulfilled.

We are committed to our Treaty relationship. As a school community, we continually reflect on how we are contributing towards reconciliation today and everyday.



MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPALS

Winter has certainly arrived, although we are still waiting to see that first blanket of snow on the ground!

This year, we made a small change to our Term 1 reporting process. Families were invited to meet with their child's teacher on November 20 or 21 to learn and celebrate their child's progress, and report cards were shared later on December 1. This updated timeline gave teachers more time to get to know their students and gain a deeper understanding of their learning through ongoing assessment. We also sent out a survey to get feedback from our families, and we appreciate everyone who took the time to share their feedback.

Thank you to all the families who attended parent-teacher conferences. Your presence, thoughtful questions, and genuine partnership mean more than words can express. When home and school work together, our students feel supported, confident, and inspired to do their best. A heartfelt thank you as well for supporting our Book Fair. Your generosity helps us continue to grow our classroom and school libraries and foster a love of reading in every child.

We also commemorated Indigenous Veterans Day and Remembrance Day with a school assembly, a respectful time to remember and honour those who lost their lives in the World Wars and in other conflicts. We paid special tribute to Indigenous Veterans of Canada, recognizing their important contributions and sacrifices, as well as the barriers and inequities many faced during and after their service. Teachers used this time to have meaningful conversations with students about justice, fairness, and the importance of remembering all stories.

November 9-15 was Bully Awareness and Prevention Week in Manitoba. At Arthur E. Wright, our teachers led discussions about kindness, inclusion, and standing up for one another. Students and staff were encouraged to wear pink, especially on Wednesday, as a visible sign of support. Throughout the week, students took part in activities that focused on empathy, respect, and building positive relationships. Our goal is always to help children understand that their words and actions matter, and that each of us plays an important role in creating a safe and caring community.

As we look ahead to the second term, our teachers are reflecting, planning, and preparing meaningful learning experiences that build on the progress already made. There is so much to look forward to, including the start of basketball season soon! We can't wait to see our students shine both in the classroom and on the court.

ROOM 4 LLABORATION

Encouraging COLLABORATION inside the classroom, Room 4 Grades ½ Fil-Bilingual students made an art-cum writing project based on their Manitoba Museum Field Trip experience. Using the book, 'Mary Meets Manitoba' as mentor text, each student was assigned to retell their 'take-out' (learning) through artwork.

Then, we made a 2D art and combined their works to create a 2D story of 'Mary Meets Manitoba, (the Room 4 version)'. They were also guided to create their own teepees using tie-dyed cloth and sticks. Their artworks signify their understanding of the Province of Manitoba, the First nation people, their beautiful culture and the natural resources.

What is interesting is that when we put their works together in chronological way, they were surprised that they were able to retell the story in twenty interesting parts represented by their 2D artworks that were put on display in our outdoor bulletin board. The highlight of their work is an array of their miniature teepees that they created representing Manitoba's First Nation's home when they travel and hunt for food. Collaboratively, Room 4 students made a statement of their understanding about the province of Manitoba, the people and culture.
