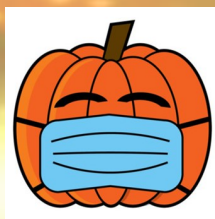

Rock Art Project: Creating a Safe and Inclusive Classroom

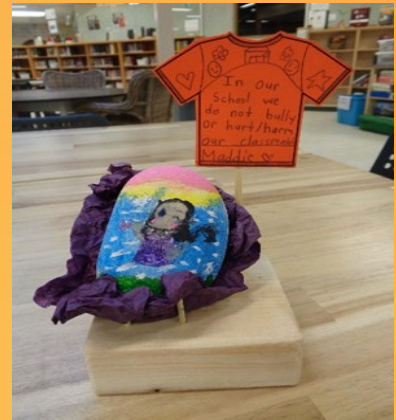

Terry Fox Walk & Run 2021

Starting in September and wrapping up in the middle of October, students at A.E.W. were learning about Terry Fox, and his “Marathon of Hope.” This year at Arthur E. Wright we participated in the Terry Fox Walk & Run on October 7th. Students from kindergarten to Grade 8 participated by either walking or running the entire route with their classroom teachers. Some students made signs and as they walked along, got cars to “Honk for Terry”. Our patrols were making sure all the street crossings were taken care of and they were a great help in keeping our route safe for all. We also had our support teachers, specialists, and admin cheering on the students along the way.



Terry was a young man who had many goals in his life and one of them was to run across all of Canada to raise awareness for cancer research. Another goal of his, back in 1980, was to collect at least 1 dollar for every Canadian. Unfortunately, he was unable to make his way from St. John’s, Newfoundland to British Columbia, and he was forced to stop his run in Thunder Bay, Ontario. What was great about this marathon was that it brought schools together and encouraged people to raise money for cancer research. After the Marathon of Hope, a few months before Terry Fox died, the goal of one dollar for each Canadian was raised.



Today, in 2021, we still collect money, and the proceeds go to continuing the research for cancer. Over the last few years as a school, we have always reached our goal of \$1000 or surpassed it. This year we wanted to collect over \$1000 and hopefully reach \$1500 by the end of the campaign drive. **The children reached their goal, and they collected over \$1900 for the Terry Fox Foundation!!**

As a reward to the children for reaching the goal of \$1000, some teachers participated in some fun activities for the students. Mrs. Constable and Mrs. Slobodian got saran wrapped to a chair, Miss Greco and Miss Richards got silly stringed, Mrs. Saray got her hair coloured pink and Mr. Militano sang “Let it Go” dressed as Elsa from Frozen. For going over \$1000 and \$1500, Mr. Fiorentino cut off his long hair and coloured it orange. Mr. Fiorentino’s father came to the school and cut the hair in front of the students on live video. Our administration also came around to all of the classroom with treats for every student for participating.

After all was said and done, the students had an amazing opportunity to meet Fred Fox, Terry Fox’s brother, through a virtual meeting. He spoke about Terry Fox and then answered questions from the students at Arthur E. Wright.

Thank you to the staff on the Terry Fox Committee for their work on making this a very successful event!

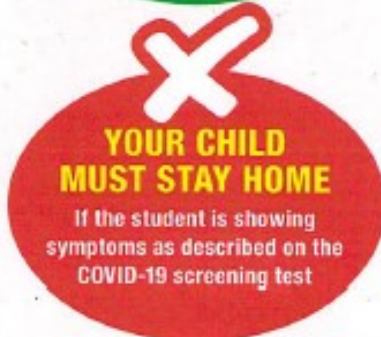


ATTENDING SCHOOL DURING COVID-19:

What you need to know



They are symptom free and are not an unvaccinated close contact of a confirmed COVID case



Sick and **NOT COVID tested**

They must stay home for **10 days** from symptom onset

Sick and **COVID tested**

If results are negative, the student can return after **24 hours** of being symptom-free




All unvaccinated family members must self-isolate for 10 days. The close contact will be asked to take a COVID test at the time of notification and 7 days after the last exposure to a case



POSITIVE COVID TEST
The entire household must follow Public Health direction



NEGATIVE COVID TEST
Close contact must continue to self-isolate for the entire 10 days – household members can return to school if the close contact test was done a minimum of seven days after exposure



TRAVEL

Each family is responsible to follow the rules that relate to their destination, purpose for travel and vaccination status.
