


REPORT TO COMMUNITY - 2019-2020

This school year reflected the importance of living our lives under the guidance of the Sacred Medicine Wheel Teachings. The Sacred Wheel is holistic and is comprised of many cardinal directions with four directional doors that represent the **Spirit** (East), Emotion, (South), the West, (Physical) and North (Mental). The Sacred Medicine Wheel is a tool that assist and guide us to live a balanced life, which in turn increases a sense of well being that interconnect us with resiliency, responsibility and reconciliation. Our school staff, the children and the parent community will continue the journey of learning and gaining a better understanding of the Sacred Medicine Wheel teachings.

Physical wellbeing continued to be an important part of our day. Coach Rick engaged the children in outdoor winter activities including skiing and snow shoeing for grades 4/5 and broomball hockey and soccer for the kindergarten/1,2 3.

Our first staff professional development day in September focused on learning about the medicine wheel teachings. Elder Mary Courchene, Sherri Denysuik and Lita Fontaine facilitated our learning. The teachers used this knowledge to teach children about the Sacred Medicine Wheel teachings to reinforce living a balanced life style.






Taking care of the land was reinforced through composting, recycling and reusing material.



NUMERACY



Through coding, a grade 4/5 class learned to engage in logic and reasoning as they created different figures and programed them to follow certain commands such as, 'move 3 steps to the left, jump 2 steps up, etc.


All children participated in several baking and cooking activities that taught and reviewed measurement and time concepts.

Math instruction continued to be taught through meaningful ways using day to day experiences. Children explored multiple approaches to solve math equations.

Teachers used **Open Questions** to engage children in rich math problem solving and rich mathematical thinking. A set of books were purchased to guide teachers in teaching and using strategies for rich math lessons.

Professional Development : Teachers spent time during their Teacher Talk Time to review the above Math resources and planned lessons to incorporate suggested strategies.




Learning opportunities were presented to children to teach and reinforce their math skills. At our Halloween popcorn sale fundraising event, children practiced and applied their skills and knowledge around money.

LITERACY

Teachers engaged in discussions around their teaching practices in English Language Arts . Teaching children to read in depth and pose questions about what they are reading were our main focus, thus reinforcing critical thinking and gaining deeper understanding. Children were taught to examine the language and pictures used in various reading texts to reflect on how issues pertaining to social justice, equity and inclusion are addressed by different authors. Revisiting and rereading stories and topics in social studies and science were particularly practiced by the teachers to provide the children a deeper meaning of what they read.





Storybooks and novels that focused on social justice, various cultural perspectives and LGBTQ, were used in classrooms to engage children in discussions about inclusion within our local and global communities.

Staff Professional Development: All staff spent time reviewing the new English Language Arts Curriculum Framework. Shelley Warkentin, cowriter of the curriculum was our facilitator. Teacher Talk Time discussions also focused on enriching our English Language instruction practices, looking at teaching children how to read texts in depth, how to ask deep questions and how to respond to texts critically.

INDIGENOUS EDUCATION

Our school community continued to learn and gain knowledge about the history and cultures of the Indigenous people of Canada. Through our staff professional development day in September and the divisional development day in October, staff engaged in discussions that supported our instruction around the Indigenous perspectives. The children continued to make announcements at the start of each day by acknowledging that 'We are on Treaty One Land and that We are all Treaty One People'.

A community gathering circle was completed this year. The circle represents the Indigenous circle of life. The circle has seven rocks to represent the Indigenous seven sacred teachings: Love, Truth, Courage, Honesty, Humility, Wisdom and Respect. The circle is used as a teaching space for the children and a community gathering space.



Chili day took place in February. Children and their families were invited and many of them attended. It was a great time spent together. We were fortunate to have the Aboriginal School of Dance perform different Pow Wow dances for us during this event. The dancers taught and engaged the children in jingle dress and shawl dance steps.

Teachers were able to read stories through videos and conducted instruction thorough Google Meets, Seesaw and Zoom meetings with their children. The children were provided with music web links, videos, and activities. Physical education activities were made available through web links, videos, zoom meetings and an invitation to bike ride and log the distance covered. In addition, hard copy work packages were photocopied and made available for families to pick up and drop off when completed.


