

REPORT TO COMMUNITY—2020-2021

Collicutt staff and students adapted very well to the changes through out this school year. There were some incredible lessons learned from the circumstances that were presented to us by coronavirus. Healthy living practices thrived where teachers and students engaged in breathing exercises, yoga, active movement and spending a lot of time outdoors. Our physical education classes took place mainly outside and there were many new experiences that the students acquired and extended into their recess breaks. For the first time, students played volleyball in winter outside! The volleyball net is still in place at the back of the school and it's being used by children and community members after school hours.



The discovery of Tk'emlups te Secwepemc First Nation's 215 unmarked graves of the children at Kamloops residential school reminded us of our responsibility to commit and continue learning about the history of Indigenous peoples of Canada. Staff and children tied orange ribbons on the fence as an active action to remember the Indigenous children who never made it home.



Room 9 students contributed to the book, 'A Part, Yet Together: A Seven Oaks School Division Anthology of Students' Writing and Art. We are grateful to City Councillor, Devi Sharma (project sponsor) as well as our divisional leadership and the True North Foundation for making this possible. Our students reflected on their strengths and resilience as they persevered through the pandemic this school year. This is a historical artefact for our community. This book will be publicly accessible in the future in Winnipeg public libraries.


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

Grade 4/5 students and their teachers spent time learning from the land outdoors. They explored the natural vegetation around the school; discovering different plant species and learning about their contribution to the ecosystems. Emotional connections to the land were developed. A practicum student, Madi, from the Wheat Institute worked with these students and she shared many valuable Métis and Indigenous knowledge.

The medicine wheel teachings guided the sharing circle as the children reflected on their feelings and wellbeing.



Duo language books were added to our library including books with Indigenous languages in Manitoba. Also, the children's languages spoken at home were celebrated through



Room 8 worked on story writing and spent a lot of time editing, illustrating and finally publishing their individual books.

Students continued to engage in learning about numeracy through repeated practice of concepts involving understanding number in actual life situations. Math talks helped the children use mathematical language. Building and experimenting with a variety of manipulatives supported the students' numeracy learning in tangible actions, from making connections between counted items to abstract math problems.





The concept of shapes and space in mathematics was explored by students through building using various materials including those used in day to day life.



Mathematical learning begins early through play and conversations in natural social situations.







During Teacher Talk Time, teachers engaged in learning and shared ideas on how to best teach mathematics in meaningful ways. Assessment for early years was examined and reviewed. This learning will be revisited next year to strengthen our teaching practices.

All the students learned the song, 'Seven' by a Manitoba local musician, William Price. The students learned sign language to this song as singing was not permitted at the time. The song 'Seven' is about the seven sacred teachings that the students are familiar with and continue to practice.





Our pre-school program continued running in person for the first two months with Sonia. For the last part of the year, early learning packages were sent home as well as online reading aloud videos. Many of our families expressed gratitude for this opportunity for their children.
