

Our school day runs from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.










At ÉSOMS, we value the French language!






Our Indigenous Cultural Group came together to have fun, learn new things, and build stronger connections—with each other, their community, their culture, the land, and their experiences as students in our schools.









The Beyond Medicine Program that our class participated in this year was a unique and rewarding opportunity for students.

Throughout the program, our class attended nine diverse sessions exploring various areas within the broad field of medicine. These included anatomy, cardiovascular studies, neuroscience, occupational therapy, physiotherapy, respiratory therapy, dentistry, pharmacy, psychology, and a special session led by administrative professionals working in healthcare.



Students engaged in hands-on, informative sessions hosted on-site at the Max Rady College of Medicine, providing them with meaningful exposure to different facets of the medical and health sciences. They reflected on their experiences through personal responses and completed miniinquiry projects inspired by the topics they encountered. Many students expressed how valuable and inspiring they found the experience, noting that it broadened their understanding of possible future careers in healthcare.
