

## **Equity and Access:**

This year, we were able to expand our Nutrition Program due to robust funding, thanks to the Child Nutrition Grants provided by key government and community stakeholders. This allowed us to provide many different opportunities for students to enjoy new and interesting foods all year long!



### **Healthy Options:**

Providing healthy food options ensures that all students have the fuel to learn at their fullest potential each day!

- Students had access to breakfast each morning which included options such as cereal, toast, fruit, smoothies, granola, bannock
- Lunch was also served to anyone who felt they wanted access - this included daily sandwiches, vegetables, salads, and special occasional items such as perogies, rice, stir fry, and pasta














# **Arts Education**

# Engaging Community







Shkola R.F. Morrison actively engaged families and the broader community through a variety of inclusive and meaningful initiatives. At Christmas, students spread joy by carolling at local nursing homes, strengthening intergenerational connections. The school also rallied surrounding neighbours to collect essential donations for fire evacuees in the spring, highlighting a strong spirit of compassion and collaboration. During spring conferences, a group of students raised money by selling handmade angels for "Help Us Help Ukraine" - a charitable organization that helps to provide children in Ukraine with programming such as summer camp. Events like the annual neighbourhood Pride Walk promoted inclusivity and acceptance, while the Human

Library event invited community members to share stories, further engaging community connections. Special guests to classrooms this year included firefighters, paramedics, dental hygienists, and police officers, who were regularly welcomed to educate and inspire students, creating lasting partnerships between the school and the community it serves.

# STEAM

(Science, Technology, Arts and Math)

This year, four Shkola R.F. Morrison teachers participated in a pilot program for the revitalized Manitoba Science Curriculum. Through their leadership, our school community will be well-prepared to roll out the curriculum once it becomes standard Manitoba practice.

Throughout the year, classes also participated in WISE Kid-Netic Workshops, which engaged students in coding and math activities, lead by students from the University of Manitoba.

In March, Rockford McKay, science facilitator from the Manitoba First Nations Resource Centre visited with his pop-up planetarium. All students had the opportunity to learn about astronomy through an Indigenous lens with his presentations!

Students in Grades 3 to 5 had the exciting opportunity to visit the University of Manitoba campus for Discovery Days, where they stepped into the role of scientists, conducting hands-on experiments in real working laboratories.


Room 4 also had a memorable year in science, observing the life cycle of chickens firsthand as they incubated eggs and watched baby chicks hatch right in their classroom.













# Indigenous Education



Shkola R.F.M. is deeply committed to reconciliation and fostering a learning environment that honours and respects Indigenous cultures and teachings. We have an active Indigenous Education Committee that guides our initiatives and ensures Indigenous perspectives are meaningfully integrated into our school community. All staff participated in treaty training this year, deepening their understanding of our shared responsibilities. At the beginning of the year, we engaged in thoughtful learning about Orange Shirt Day to reflect on the legacy of residential schools. This June, we held a school-wide Summer Solstice Day, which invited guests to share teachings, stories and to celebrate with us. Additionally throughout the year, the Indigenous Word of the Week engaged classrooms in language learning, Powwow instruction provided students with opportunities to learn traditional dances, and we continue to enrich our library with books by Indigenous authors, amplifying Indigenous voices and stories throughout the school.

In February, we held a Festival Du Voyageur week, which taught students about Métis culture and traditions. Students participated in activities such as Bannock making and toque weaving. The week ended with an energetic performance from local musicians, TiBert et Douzie!







# Climate Action

Our school is dedicated to taking meaningful climate action through handson learning and community involvement.
This year, students and teachers took initiatives to host regular community and playground clean-ups to encourage environmental responsibility and care for our shared spaces. In partnership with Heather Eckton, our division's Climate Action Team Leader, we continuously grew our sustainability practices.

Our active student-led recycling and composting teams helped to reduce waste and promote eco-friendly habits throughout the school. Additionally, our garden greening teams worked hard to create vibrant, sustainable outdoor spaces that connect students with nature and support local biodiversity. Through these initiatives, we continue to build a culture of environmental stewardship with the goal of empowering students to be leaders in climate action.















# English-Ukrainian Bilingual Program

Our school is proud to celebrate and preserve Ukrainian culture and language through the vibrant and inclusive Ukrainian Bilingual Program. We are committed to providing students with meaningful opportunities to learn the Ukrainian language, explore cultural traditions, and connect with their heritage. Throughout the year, students engaged in cultural activities such as Ukrainian dance, music, art, and holiday celebrations that highlight the richness of Ukrainian customs. 




# **Cultural Diversity**


