## \$10,000 Scholarship Lives On

Filipino Music and Arts Association of Canada Inc. and Seven Oaks Education Foundation Establish a permanent Music and Arts Leadership Award



The goal of a scholarship is to both encourage and assist students in pursuing a post-secondary education. That's why permanent scholarships are so important; they continue to help students year after year.

The ISKOLAR: Music and Arts Night held on October 29, 2022 was initiated by the Filipino Music and Arts Association of Canada Inc. (FMAACI). The fundraiser was held in support of the ongoing fundraising efforts of Seven Oaks Education Foundation (SOEF) to create more permanent scholarships and bursaries.

Held at the Seven Oaks Performing Arts Centre (SOPAC), the event was a rousing success, showcasing the wide variety of talented people in the Seven Oaks community. Perhaps more importantly, the fundraiser raised a total of \$7,014.29 in donations, with those proceeds going to SOEF.

Fast forward to a SOEF Board meeting where it was resolved, "That the SOEF top up the donations with \$2,985.71 and together with the \$7,014.29 received, transfer \$10,000 to the Winnipeg Foundation to establish the FMAACI-SOEF Music & Arts Leadership Scholarship Fund that will live in perpetuity."

With that, the latest scholarship was created, giving music and arts students another opportunity to explore their potential in a post-secondary environment.
