Hundreds of people converged on the West St. Paul Sunova Center on Wednesday, April 18<sup>th</sup> to take in the West St. Paul Community Eco-Fair. In attendance were students, parents, grandparents, friends, community members and visitors from other areas of Winnipeg. The West St. Paul mayor and councillors, the MLA and Seven Oaks School Trustee were all in attendance to take in ideas.

On display were dozens of ideas to help reduce one's carbon footprint. Many students were on hand to explain their ideas for making our community and our world a cleaner and greener place in which to live. Some of the projects included bird feeders, reusable snack bags, composting, using rainwater, a recycled cityscape, a futuristic city, reusable water bottles, a solar panel and solar heater. Student works were an amazing set of learning shared with the community.

Commercial displays included Climate Change Connection, East Interlake Conservation District, Lake Friendly, Manitoba Eco-Network, Manitoba Forestry Association, Manitoba Hydro, Norwex, Sunova Credit Union, and Waste Minimization Industries.

Many eco-friendly giveaways were distributed at the eco-fair. These items included reusable grocery bags, light bulbs, poplar trees, pencils made of recycled newspapers and reusable produce bags. Each person left with many ideas of how to reduce their personal impact on our environment.

#### **UNESCO Student Conference**



May 3,4,5 and 6, 60 students from Winnipeg UNESCO schools attended a student conference in Olds, Alberta. There were 200 students from all over Western Canada at the conference and nine other schools from across Canada participated in the morning of video conferences with Justin Trudeau and Jennifer Corliano. They both talked about how every single person can make a difference in the world.

We stayed in the dorms at Olds College. All sessions were held at the Olds High School.

#### **UNESCO Trip 2011**

The first session I attended at the conference was the African drumming. We started out by telling stories with the beat of our drums and learning about the world and where our teacher was from. We also learned about coloured people and how they've contributed to the world - people like Kobe Bryant, Denzel Washington, Oprah Winfrey, Will Smith and many more were included in his teachings.

In the second session I took, I learned about racism, discrimination and stereotypes. We played a game which was to write down your opinions on the words "third world" and "Islam". The purpose of this was to show how many stereotypes there are in the world, but these words were about a nine year old girl and it was to teach us about what these stereotypes can do to a person. We also played a choice game where they'd ask you a question and you had to either pick, yes, nor or be indecisive about it and explain your choice. Some of the questions were, "Do you think there is more racism in the world now than there was 20 years ago?" and "Do you think you have the power to stop racism?" Everyone had good opinions on why they chose their choice and I think this was my favourite session.






# Seven Oaks School Division Arts Camp 2011





## **MY Camp – The Details**



#### What?

Each student must have parental permission and transportation to and from camp each day. For the intensive sessions, equipment may be required. Each student must also bring a lunch and pay the registration fee.


